Luke 4:16-19 – <sup>16</sup> He went to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, and on the Sabbath day he went into the synagogue, as was his custom. He stood up to read, <sup>17</sup> and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was handed to him. Unrolling it, he found the place where it is written: 18 "The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free, 19 to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."

It is cold! As I am writing this, the temperature is not even above 0. Normally there are plenty of winter activities to do, but when it's this cold, those activities are simply not that appealing. It's been two days of this cold, and at least it's expected to be warmer than zero tomorrow, but in the meantime the kids have been cooped up inside the house. Even though it's a snow day because of the cold, the kids are trapped. It's too cold to do anything outside, and venturing out in a cold car does not sound like that much fun. So even though they have the day off of school, they are stuck inside the house longing to be free.

I would make the argument that winter does trap us in its cold grasp until the spring thaws us out and the summer gets us out. The nights are long and the wind is cold. More often than not, it is tempting to stay where it's nice and warm than to brave the cold. Yes, there are things that we can do during the winter to keep us moving; skiing/snowboarding, sledding, ice skating, ice fishing, etc. There is a lot that can be done, yet people still feel trapped by the cold of winter.

In Luke Jesus reads from Isaiah where it says that He was sent to proclaim Good News to the poor...to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free..." Basically to take those people who feel trapped in this life and set them free. Jesus sets those of us who are trapped free. Free from the weight of our sin and all the things in this life that separate us from God.

We are all born in a broken world. We live in a world where the cold wind of sin and selfishness has broken in and trapped us in its icy grasp. Sin breaks us and our world, and Jesus wants to set you free from sin's icy grasp into the warmth of His Light. We live in a

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world where we are often weighed down by the weight of our sin and the baggage that we carry. There are many people who feel trapped; like the winter will never end. But Jesus came to set those of us who are oppressed in any way free.

If you feel trapped; if you feel like the winter in your life is never-ending; if you carry any sort of burden, you have a God who enters into your life and carries those things for you. That's what the cross is all about; Jesus bearing the weight of your sin and your baggage so you can be free from it. If you're carrying around baggage and feel trapped in the icy grasp of winter, you have a God who fights for you; who can set you free from the winters of life.

#### Parish Board Notes

Our Parish Articles of Agreement require the Parish Board to meet quarterly to conduct the business and oversee the ministry of our Parish. The Board did meet at 6 p.m. on January 6<sup>th</sup> at First Presbyterian Church. Six members of Bethlehem's Council and three members from First's Session were present. Bill Fleming opened the meeting with prayer.

This was our first meeting since the November retirement of Pastor Cathy Morris, who also had been our chairperson. The Articles state that in the absence of the Pastor, the current president of Bethlehem's Council or the current Clerk of Session of First Presbyterian, shall preside on a rotating basis. Consensus of those present was that the chairperson for this meeting be Karen Wertanen, current Clerk of Session at First, and going forward with our rotating meeting plan, the next meeting will be chaired by Bethlehem's Council President, currently Bill Fleming. Both churches will be having annual meetings soon and positions may change at that time.

Anticipating changes on both the Session and Council, which means new members on the Board, a secretary will be elected from the Parish Board members at our next meeting. Karen volunteered to do the minutes of this meeting.

We received reports from the GriefShare program, Pastoral Support Committee, and those updating the Parish Directory. Bill Fleming, who is attending a Presbyterian series of classes for "Cultivating the Gift of Preaching" and similar Lutheran classes, shared that he is doing a scripture reading for the virtual worship service prepared for Sunday, December 29<sup>th</sup>.

The Board is grateful to have the assistance of Bishop Katherine Finegan, Northern Great Lakes Synod, Rev. Daniel Van Beek from the Commission on Ministry, Presbytery of Mackinac, and Rev. Dave Johnson, Pastor of Bethany Lutheran of Norway, MI, and Calvary Lutheran, Quinnesec, MI, who is serving as our Administrative Interim. Rev. Johnson has sought lay persons and ministers willing to provide pulpit supply for our churches and he will assist with other pastoral duties. Rev. Van Beek, Pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Escanaba, MI, comes to First to lead Session meetings and is our connection to the Presbytery. We are especially thankful for those, who on short notice, came to us to lead worship in the busy month of December; Gisele Duehring, Rev. Rell Spickerman, our own Bill Fleming, and Bishop Finegan. Rev. Spickerman, who drives from Gwinn, Michigan, has offered to preach on Sundays through May. Plans for our special services during Lent will be announced soon.

After reviewing the 2024 financial reports of our Parish Board treasurer, JoAnne Friberg, and Barb Marden, we then completed the Parish budget for 2025. The new budget is a lower total than 2024, due to our status without a Pastor. We are paying for weekly pulpit supply and mileage, as well as for the assistance provided by Rev. Johnson and Rev. Van Beek. The per church monthly payment will be \$3,200 in 2025. The budget will be included for discussion at our congregational annual meetings.

We were pleased to hear that a donation has been received to provide Vacation Bible School in July and Deb Fleming has volunteered to be our VBS coordinator! We had a great week in 2024!

The Board expressed thanks to our Administrative Assistant, Leanne Wilcox, for her excellent work on our behalf and we closed in prayer.

**Item 1:** Call to Order: The meeting was called to order at 6:06 pm by President, Bill Fleming. Other council members in attendance include: Ben Lehto, Deb Fleming, Diane Theis, JoAnne Friberg, and Connie Walther. Also in attendance were Pastor Dave Johnson and Leanne Wilcox.

Item 2: Opening Prayer: Pastor Dave offered the opening prayer.

Item 3: Secretary's report: Minutes from the December 10<sup>th</sup> meeting were reviewed. Discussion ensured regarding carpet cleaning yearly vs. new carpet. It was decided by consensus that this item will be discussed this coming Fall (2025). JoAnne made a motion to accept the minutes and Connie seconded the motion. All were in favor and the motion carried.

Item 4: Treasurer's Report: Diane provided handouts to all present and reported that a large donation was received and applied to the General Fund and the donation from Wild Rivers Quilt Guide would be applied to the Building Fund. Discussion regarding putting some of the money market funds into a CD took place. Diane will check on the current interest rates before action would be taken on this matter. Deb motioned to accept the treasurer's report and Connie seconded the motion. All were in favor and the motion carried.

**Item 5 - Pastor's Update:** Pastor Dave shared the following:

Pastor Doug Johnson presided over communion at the Christmas Eve service

Pastor Rell Spickerman will provide pulpit supply until May 2025. Pastor Dave will check on pulpit supply, as well as communion on Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. Leanne volunteered to check previous bulletins to determine what days communion was served.

## Item 6 - Synod and ELCA news:

- Mission Support Letters will be discussed during the budget discussion
- NGLS offering Lenten devotionals. Bill will get the website to Leanne for publication.

JoAnne made the motion to include the Mission Support Commitment and Diane seconded the motion. All were in favor and the motion carried. The proposed budget will be presented to the congregation at the Annual Meeting on Feb. 2, 2025.

Item 14: Camera-Zoom services: There were issues with the sound during the service if not by a microphone (could not hear music, singing, announcements made by congregation). Discussed possible solutions including adding more microphones throughout the church or possibly installing drop down microphones from the ceiling. Will continue to work on the sound issue.

## **Session Meeting Notes**

Rev. Daniel Van Beek, who moderated, called our January 12, 2025, meeting of the Session to order in the Conference Room at 2:00 p.m. and opened with prayer. Ruling Elders Jim Churchill, Debra DeMuri, Greg Novak, Janice Roberts and Karen Wertanen, who is also Clerk of Session, were present. Frank DeCleene was absent. A quorum was declared.

We then approved the agenda.

Rev. Van Beek shared that he plans to do a brief training on the pastoral search process with us at our next meeting. In answer to our question about using bread cubes and/or prepared wafers for Communion, he explained that both are fine according to our "Book of Order".

### In the Clerk's Report:

The minutes of the December 15, 2024 meeting of the Session were approved. As usual the minutes were sent via e-mail to the members and Rev. Van Beek prior to the meeting.

For the record, Karen noted that we celebrated the Lord's Supper during worship on Christmas Eve with Gisele Duehring presiding and on Sunday, January 5<sup>th</sup> with Rev. Rell Spickerman presiding.

Karen also shared that the Parish Board met on January 6<sup>th</sup>. The main agenda items were to review the 2024 financial reports prepared by JoAnne Friberg, Parish Board treasurer, and Barb Marden, and to prepare the Parish Budget for 2025.

In a discussion about worship, a decision was made to ask our scripture readers to also serve as greeters each Sunday. We will continue to pass the collection plate.

Session then reviewed the reports submitted by our Treasurer as of December 31, 2024. Karen provided our investment account current balance. Session members had met via phone conference with our Nicolet Wealth Investment Advisor, Steve Farone, on December 16<sup>th</sup>.

In view of the minimal interest received on our Memorial Fund Savings account, a motion was duly made, seconded and carried to transfer a portion of those funds to our investment account and to also open two CDs at the Great North Bank where the savings account is held. Karen will talk with our treasurer about these transactions.

It was noted that in 2024, the Session had decided to use undated envelopes since many members were contributing monthly or bimonthly. That leaves half or more of the envelopes in the boxes for continued use in 2025. New boxes will be available in the church office for anyone needing envelopes. (See an additional announcement in this newsletter.) A separate envelope will be provided for those who wish to contribute the \$41.40 per capita requested by the Presbytery each year for each member. (They will be in the sanctuary on the table.)

Debbie reported for our Deacons noting that the Christmas decorations were taken down in the sanctuary after worship this morning. They have appreciated hearing positive comments about them. Cleaning the kitchen (volunteers are welcome) and working on the church directory are on their agenda for February. "Come to Supper" will be on Monday, February 24<sup>th</sup>. A potluck meal is set for the day of our annual congregational meeting, Sunday, January 26<sup>th</sup> at 1:00 p.m.

Our nominating committee is contacting members for the positions opening for our Deacons and Session. Election will take place at the annual meeting.

Greg is seeking a company to do a capacity test required for our elevator/lift every five years.

The "Dwelling in the Word" Bible Study was today at Bethlehem. Next on February 9<sup>th</sup>.

Session then prepared our 2025 budget (Total \$59,275.00), which was approved by a motion duly made, seconded and carried. It will be reviewed at the annual congregational meeting.

In Presbytery and Synod news, Karen is serving on the Committee on Representation and Nominations for the Presbytery. The Presbytery of Mackinac next meeting will be virtual and is set for February 22<sup>nd</sup> at 10 a.m. EST.

Our prayers of intercession list will start anew with 2025. Please contact Leanne at the office or complete one of the prayer cards that are in the sanctuary for your requests.

Rev. VanBeek shared information about the changes in the special offerings for our denomination. Consensus was that we again participate in "One Great Hour of Sharing" during Lent. Special Lenten services have yet to be decided.

Property Committee agenda items discussed were:

- Debbie and Karen have checked the interior of the manse. Pr. Cathy is storing items there. Temp sensors have arrived and will be activated.
- Greg has a monitor that may work with the WIFI camera for the entrance.
- The storage building behind the church is available for the taking and moving.
- Jan and her brother checked the water leaking under the kitchen sinks. Water is going under the lip of the sinks, which additional clamps and caulking will correct.

Karen will be out of town on February 2<sup>nd</sup>, so someone is needed to set up Zoom.

The next Session meeting was set for Sunday, **February 16<sup>th</sup>** at 2:00 p.m. Rev. Van Beek then closed in prayer and the meeting was adjourned at 3:20 p.m.
